parasites that can infect humans. The bubonic plague, rampant during the seventeenth century, was caused by diseased fleas found on rats. The "vermin" can also carry ticks, notorious for lyme disease. Other diseases carried by rats could include West Nile Virus, rabies, ehrlichiosis, Rat Bite Fever, and Hantavirus pulmonary syndrome. Hantavirus, spread by breathing in dried particles of rat feces or urine, is most commonly

found in the southwestern United States and eastern Pennsylvania.

In addition to spreading diseases, rats can contaminate food, destroy wires, and invade sewers. All of this damage costs

branch of the US Military could come to school and ask for your most personal information (name, address, and telephone number), and by law the school is required to hand it over.

The new law which this pertains to is called the No Child Left Behind Act. This new law, passed by Congress, recognizes "the challenges faced by military recruiters" and "requires high schools to provide to military recruiters, upon request, access to secondary school students and directory information on those students."

This law gives recruiters the same access to your personal information just as college recruiters and prospective employers do. Recruiters argue that the military is a means for young

As of January this year, any people to attain specific job train- not comply with the new act by ing and education in specialty withholding information, their fields. And for many who do not have the means to go to college or attend a trade school, the military can offer them a promising future.

> In order for military recruiters to not be able to access students' personal information, a parent must have filled out a paper at the beginning of the year to protect their students' information (name and address) from being dispensed. The marking of either: withheld (no) or available (yes) for the armed forces recruiters will tell the school if they may offer the information or not. If a student marks "No," his information will not be given out. However, this may end up costing schools vital federal money because if a school does

federal funding will be cut.

Many schools around Sonoma County are refusing to hand over the information of their students when recruiters ask for it. Even though Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld, and Secretary of Education, Rod Paige sent out letters to schools. Most, if not all, recruiters are coming up short because schools are not abiding by the new law.

Because of this, many schools will lose federal funding, unless Congress decides to amend the law. Many people at our school share the view that if people stop volunteering to serve our nation, more laws such as this one will be in place with stricter consequences especially if we go to


Students will no longer receive messages in the classroom from the Attendance Office. Due to budget cuts and issues about privacy, parent volunteers will no longer be allowed to work in the Attendance Office, while student T.A's will no longer be permitted to pass out call slips.

Because call slips will no longer be sent out to students, there is a new "Message Board" in the Attendance Office where students will be able to check for messages during break and lunch, and before or after school.

Judy Gunnick hopes that the message board will encourage students to be more responsible for bringing their own passes.

The following automated message was sent out December 2 to all students, "Due to financial cutbacks in the Attendance Office, we will no longer have the capability to deliver personal messages to students. Please send a note with your student in the morning so that they will be able to get a pass as needed."

According to Gunnick, "We are the only school who has been sending out personal messages to students." The message board is currently in use and up to date. Gunnick encourages the student body to "remember their notes and passes."


While at our high school, the bus staff spends the day leading workshops, producing sessions, and conducting walking tours of the facility for students


Door decorating brings controversy



Ms. Smith's biggest adjustments are definitely going to be



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

Tupac: The ongoing thug life

After leaving the Mike Tyson fight in Las Vegas on Saturday September 7, 1996, Tupac Amaru Shakur and his executive producer, Suge Night, got into their car. Tupac was allegedly shot at 12 times, and hit by 5 of the bullets. He lived through the shooting and was taken to a nearby hospital. He was pronounced dead seven days after the shooting, Friday September 13, 1996 at 4:03 PM. There are many people who believe that Tupac did not really die on September 13. Numerous facts lead us to believe that Tupac is still alive today.

Tupac always wore a bulletproof vest, no matter where he went. Why did he remove it at a very public event like a Tyson fight? The vehicle that Tupac and Suge were riding in was shot at 12 times, yet Suge was never hit. After the shooting, they rushed to a nearby hospital. Suge claims to have had a coherent conversation with Tupac. How could a coherent conversation have taken place when Tupac had been hit five times?

The white Cadillac that was supposed to contain the shooters was never found. Las Vegas is in the middle of a desert. Why was there no police or helicopter chase? When someone that famous is targeted by a gunman, a search ensues immediately.

Suge Night and his crew have been very uncooperative with the police in solving the murder case. If someone as successful as Tupac is killed, don't you think his label owners would want to find the killers? A reward was never offered to anyone who had any information leading to the arrest of the shooter. The record label that Tupac was under had a surplus of money. If Tupac really had been killed, they would have offered a reward to find who committed the crime.


In many of his songs, Tupac raps about being buried. So why was he supposedly cremated the day after he died? And since when do they cremate someone the day after death in a murder case? In fact, it is illegal to be cremated or buried before an autopsy is performed in a murder

case. An autopsy never was conducted. There were never any photos released of Tupac in the hospital. Press was not going to be allowed at the funeral, but the funeral was mysteriously cancelled for unknown reasons.

Tupac's alias is Makaveli. Although the spelling is different, Machiavelli was a century Italian philosopher who advocated the staging of one's own death in order to gain power and evade enemies. One of Machiavelli's books is **Discourses Upon the** First Ten Books of Titus Livy, which Tupac read in jail. In Book 2, he says "a prince who wishes to achieve great things must learn to deceive...". This is very similar to verses in some Tupac's songs. Machiavelli's books were titled Book 1 and Book 2. The two discs that make up the album "All Evez on Me" are entitled Book 1 and Book 2. Also, on the first CD that came out after his death, his name is Makaveli. On that CD, there was nothing that said Tupac

> RIP or anything of the sort. It only said "Exit Tupac, Enter Makaveli". Is this implying a reincarnation of sorts?

There are some that speculate about Tupac's number being 7. This is associated with many different aspects of his "death". Tupac died at the age of 25 at 4:03. 2+5=7: 4+3=7. He was shot on September 7, survived until the 7th day, and died Exactly 7 months later, his album "All Eyez on Me" was released. In one video that came out after his death but was supposedly

made before, Tupac enters a hospital room that is number 7. The clock in the background says 4:03. Is this all purely coincidence?

There are many different references in Tupac's albums and videos that lead us to believe he is still alive. The video for "I Ain't Mad At Cha" was released only days before Tupac's "death". It depicts Tupac being gunned down much of the way he was really shot. He dies in that video. In his next video, his name is no longer Tupac, it is Makaveli. On the cover of The 7-Day Theory, there is a picture of Tupac being crucified. This fits with the idea that Tupac "died" so he could be reincarnated as Makaveli. In the picture, there are five bullet holes. Interestingly, Tupac was "shot" five times. In the "Hail Mary" video, there is a gravestone that says "Makaveli". It is cracked and there is a hole in front of it; this implies that Makaveli rose from the dead.

In one of his songs, "Life of an Outlaw" on the album the 7-Day Theory, he says "All for the street fame on how to be managed, to plan shit, six months in advance to what we plotted, approved to go on swole and now I got it..." This implies that Tupac planned his "death" in advance and is now

enjoying the success of his plan. In "Hold Ya Head", before Tupac begins rapping, a voice says "Can you see him?" Another voice replies, "I see him." Then Tupac softly says, "I'm alive..." In another one of his songs, Tupac says rest in peace, Biggie. Biggie did not die until six months after Tupac. How could he have foretold the future?

Most likely, Tupac is living on an island somewhere in the Pacific with all his breezies getting everything he wants...if you know what I mean. He's still doing what he loves, rapping and making billions, but without the media hounding him. He even said in an interview before his supposed death that he was sick of the "press folk". Doesn't this sound like a life you would love? It took a lot of planning and preparation to pull off such a stunt, but only a mastermind such as Tupac could do it. And God bless him for it, because Tupac lives on, not only in the music we enjoy, but in the hearts of millions.

Tupac's new double disc album, "Better Dayz", dropped November 26, 2002, so go get yourself a copy if you haven't already. Employers: do not read

If you are a student worker between the ages of 14 and 17, it is important that you know your rights and laws that pertain to your employment.

It is illegal to work without a worker's permit, except for working at odd jobs like babysitting or something at someone's home.

If you are 14-15:

When school is in session:

- daily max: 3 hours
- weekly max: 18 hours (23 hours if student is attending Work Experience Education Program)

When school is not in session: - daily max: 8 hours

- weekly max: 40 hours Students may work from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m. June 1 through September 1, and until 7 p.m. the remainder of the year

If you are 16-17:

When school is in session: - daily max: 4 hours

When school is not in session:

- daily max: 8 hours
- weekly max: 48 hours (8 hours per day for student attending Work Experience Education Program)

Students are allowed to work 5 a.m. through 10 p.m. (On days preceeding non-school days, students may work until 12:30 a.m.)

Rights of student workers

- A safe working environment
- Training about chemicals that may cause dangers in your work place
- Training provided about what to do in an emergency
- Protective clothing and equipment
- Payment for medical care if you are hurt or sick because of your job(you may also be entitled to lost wages)
- Being paid minimum wage, \$6.75 (although in some cases you may be paid 85% of that in the first 160 hours of working if you have no experience in that field.)

Resident physicist used to help in oil spills

On November 19, a tanker carrying more than 20 million gallons of oil split in two and sunk off the Northwest coast of Spain. The Prestige tanker was single hulled, now illegal in new ships, and rumor has it, had been deemed unseaworthy various

times before its demise in a storm 130 miles off the coast. The ship is now lying more than two miles down on the ocean floor. The sunken tanker is a virtual time

bomb and environmentalists say if the ship does collapse the effects could be worse than that of the 1989 Exxon Valdez spill off

the coast of Alaska. Already, the contents of the Prestige oil tanker have strewn the coasts of Spain and Portugal with a sticky black blanket. The spill not only threatens the well being of the envi-

> r o n ment,

but the livelyhood of those who live in coastal fishing villages.

To get a first hand account of oil spills

and their effects on the environment I spoke to Rob Lee, our resident physisct, who used to work for the Bird Research Center in Berkley, California, as well as branch Chevron's oil spill research center. Among many

tnings, Lee did research regarding the treatment of oiled water foul. His work often entailed cleaning birds, clearing their systems of oil by way of tube feeding, and readying them for their return to the wild. In his work with oiled avis, Lee and his coworkers found dishwashing fluid was "really the best at cutting grease," and would use it when cleaning their feathers to inhibit further oil ingestion. While working with the Bird Research Center and Chevron, Lee said, "The workers were paid very little, but it was a job which had to be done." After seeing "the devastating effect of spills on the environment and economy," Lee feels single hulled oil tankers, like that of the Prestige, are "criminal."


state team, Mia has to prove to


